THE JOINT COMMISSION Aside from brevity, the biggest difference between the Joint Commission standards for antimicrobial stewardship and the CMS CoP is the the former is much more specific, as can be seen on the Table on the next page. Therefore, compliance with the Joint Commission would ensure an institution has also met the CoP proposed by CMS.

The Joint Commission, for example, performs unannounced onsite surveys for its clients every 18 to 36 months, whereas Det Norske Veritas and Germanischer Lloyd (DNV GL), a newer accrediting organization, performs annual onsite inspections.

DNV Healthcare, Joint Commission emphasize differences. Four years on, upstart nears 350 clients. In the few years since DNV Healthcare became the first new company in 40 years to win deeming status from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), some 320 of the 5,800 registered facilities have opted to use the OH-based company rather than The Joint Commission (TJC).

THE JOINT COMMISSION. Formerly JCAHO. Established – 1992: Incorporated – 1979: Established – 1951: Accredits ASC (ambulatory surgical centers) and OBS (office based surgery) facilities only. Surgeons must be board certified/eligible in their specialty areas that is recognized by the American Board of Medical Specialties (ABMS)

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
